Subject webpage

The WJEC GCSE English Literature subject webpage on the WJEC website is the starting place for anyone teaching the specification and contains a range of official documentation relating to the qualification including the specification, sample assessment materials and past papers.

Portal

The <u>WJEC Portal</u> is a secure area for centres to access resources. These include past papers and marking schemes (ahead of their publication on the public website), as well as access to other resources such as the Unit 3 NEA Assessment tasks (that are changed each year) and CPD materials.

For teachers to access Portal, they will need a username and password, this will be set up by their Examinations Officer.





Then use the dropdown menus to choose the papers that you are looking for:




Past papers on public website

June series	Between 1 st and 31 st July, the year after the examination has taken place




3. Marking Schemes




Marking schemes are available to accompany question papers from past examination series, providing instructions on how to apply the marking criteria, examples of indicative content, and assessment grids articulating the banded descriptors for different levels of responses.

Marking schemes on Portal (from Results Day)

Marking schemes are published initially on <u>Portal</u> on Results Day for the examination series. To locate the marking schemes, select 'Past Papers & Marking Schemes' from the 'Resources' menu on the left-hand side of the screen:






Online Exam Review (Marked Exemplar)








6. Newsletters



GCSE English Literature – Shakespeare Resources



These Shakespeare resources (<u>Macbeth</u>, <u>Romeo and Juliet</u>, <u>Approaches to Shakespeare</u> and <u>Approaches to Shakespeare (Student Focused)</u>) can be used to guide learners in their preparation of the Unit 3 Section A Shakespeare NEA.

GCSE English Literature – Poetry Resources



These poetry resources (Making Meaningful Comparisons, Developing critical analysis, Welsh writing in English, poetry resources; Welsh writing in English (Love); Poetry Resources (student focused); Readings of selected poems from the WJEC GCSE Poetry Anthology) can be used to guide learners in their preparation of the Unit 3 Section B Poetry NEA.



GCSE English Literature – Exam Walk Through





Grade boundaries


Grade boundaries from past examination series are available on the subject webpage.




If you click on 'Grade Boundaries' this will take you to <u>Administration > Results, Grade Boundaries</u> and PRS.



Grade boundary information is available for every unit. Make sure you select the correct information from the drop down.



Exam Results Analysis



Exam Results Analysis can be used by teachers to:

- Evaluate a learner's performance against specification norms.
- Identify strengths and weaknesses for a candidate cohort and suggest areas of improvement.
- Assist individual candidates in improving their own performance.

It can be accessed on <u>Portal</u> and allows teachers to compare a learners' performance on each question with that of the candidature overall, so that it is possible to see where they have done well and where there might be room for improvement. To do this, under the 'Results' tab, click on 'Item Level Data' or 'Centre Performance' for comparable data.






NEA Standardising Exemplar

NEA standardising exemplars are available on <u>Portal</u> to support teachers standardising the marking of the NEA assessment.


