## The Made-for-Wales qualifications' journey continues

As we mark the start of teaching of the first Wave of our Made-for-Wales qualifications, Richard Harry, Executive Director: Qualifications and Assessment reflects on the collaborative journey that has shaped the development of these qualifications.

Our Made-for-Wales suite represents a fundamental shift in qualification development. Purpose-built from the ground up, these qualifications are meticulously aligned with the Curriculum for Wales and its Four Purposes. Following years of focused development, they equip learners with real-world skills through coherent, accessible content that integrates local, national, and international contexts. This enables teachers and lecturers to connect lessons to meaningful experiences.

## Co-constructing through strategic partnerships

From day one, we embedded stakeholder voices at the heart of our development process. Our Qualification Development, Stakeholder Reference, Learner and Union Advisory groups provided essential insights that shaped these qualifications from conception, ensuring alignment with the Curriculum for Wales.

Collaborations with anti-racism consultant Rachel Clarke and the Diversity and Anti-Racist Professional Learning (DARPL) group proved particularly valuable by enhancing our design process to ensure we developed an inclusive qualification suite.

Separately, broader stakeholder discussions revealed equity considerations, which we addressed by implementing appropriate controls for each non-examination assessment, ensuring that learners wouldn't be disadvantaged by having less access to particular resources at home.

Working with a wide range of stakeholders has allowed us to deepen our existing understanding of Wales' unique bilingual education landscape, ensuring our qualifications effectively serve Welsh medium, English medium and bilingual schools and colleges across the country.

## Supporting our teaching community

To ensure our teaching community received the necessary support to deliver the new qualifications with confidence, we published the approved specifications in autumn 2024, followed by Sample Assessment Materials and Guidance for Teaching that winter.

Responding to stakeholder views, we adjusted our timeline for GCSE Religious Studies to ensure thorough consideration of all feedback and moved GCSE History to first teaching from September 2026, to allow educators more time to familiarise themselves with the new qualification.





Additionally, we delivered a comprehensive Professional Learning programme offering online and face-to-face opportunities to suit the busy schedules of teachers and lecturers. Our pan-Wales 'Preparing to Teach' events provided us with an opportunity to talk directly with thousands of educators across Wales, allowing us to showcase the raft of support available to aid the delivery of each qualification, while offering practical insights and strategies; including walking educators through key areas like Non-Examination Assessments.

Our free Digital Resources formed another crucial support component, offering flexible, on-demand assistance to help schools manage the transition effectively. Developed based on feedback from schools and colleges, these resources represent part of a £1.5 million investment, creating 325 bespoke bilingual packages.

Each package includes Blended Learning resources and Knowledge Organisers aligned with the Curriculum for Wales. These can be easily edited and adapted to suit each school's or college's unique context, embracing the Welsh concept of Cynefin — enabling learners to develop a sense of place and promoting an understanding of Wales and how our culture, people and landscape relate to the rest of the world.

## Wave 3: the journey continues

Building on this foundation, our third Wave is now in development, offering learners a diverse portfolio that will engage them through handson practical experiences and skills development. This includes a Personal

Project and Skills Suite, as well as a range of Foundation qualifications and the Vocational Certificate of Secondary Education (VCSEs).

Utilising our established expertise, these qualifications prioritise learner engagement while upholding our rigorous standards, ensuring learners develop the skills and knowledge their future careers demand. In development of the next Wave, we are maintaining our collaborative approach by extending our partnerships to industry stakeholders to design qualifications that equip learners with relevant skills for the future workforce.

## Reflecting on our impact

Consolidating this work to create qualifications that prepare learners for their next steps in education has been incredibly rewarding. We've witnessed first-hand how these qualifications resonate with learners, whose invaluable perspectives have complemented those from teachers and lecturers throughout our development journey.

Thank you for being part of this journey. As we continue the Made-for-Wales journey, we look forward to collaborating with you again to ensure our next Wave of qualifications continue to meet the needs of Wales' learners and their futures.

As the delivery of our first Wave of Made-for-Wales qualifications begins in classrooms across the country, we're proud to reflect on our journey supporting educators. Through our nationwide Professional Learning and comprehensive Digital Resources, we've created a free robust support package that empowers educators to deliver our qualifications with confidence.

## Professional Learning: Building expertise nationwide

Working in close collaboration with Welsh Government, Local Authorities, Regional Consortia and Cymdeithas Ysgolion Dros Addysg Gymraeg (CYDAG), our Professional Learning programme has made significant impact across Wales.

#### The nationwide roadshow delivered:

- 170 events spanning 12 days
- Support for diverse educational settings including Secondary Schools, pupil referral units (PRUs), Special Schools, and Independent Schools
- Practical guidance and implementation strategies for our Made-for-Wales GCSEs

The programme's effectiveness is evident in participant feedback, with 75% of attendees reporting 'good' or 'extremely good' understanding of the new qualifications after attending sessions.

Housed within our bespoke resources' website, our Made-for-Wales Digital Resources are presented on an intuitive, user-friendly platform designed specifically for educators.

#### They offer:

- Adaptability for meaningful learning: Resources can be easily edited and localised to align with each school or college's unique learning context, ensuring relevance to learners through the concept of Cynefin\*.
- Personal resource management: A user-friendly dashboard allows educators to access favourited, edited, or saved resources, enabling a learner-centred approach tailored to individual needs.
- **Simple sharing capabilities:** Each tailored resource will have a unique URL for seamless sharing and home learning support.

To further enhance this package, WJEC is working alongside Adnodd, who has **committed £500,000** to produce additional support materials for these qualifications.

## Looking ahead

As we continue our journey to develop the second Wave of our Made-for-Wales qualifications, we are pleased to confirm that our Digital Resources Team will be producing a package of FREE bilingual resources for each subject. The package will mirror the support offered for the first qualification Wave and will consist of Blended Learning resources and Knowledge Organisers for the second group of qualifications which will be taught from September 2026.

#### Building on proven expertise: From Made-for-Wales GCSEs to a comprehensive qualification suite

While some may view WJEC as solely a General Qualifications awarding body, our expertise extends far beyond. Prior to the current reform programme, we established ourselves as developers of General, Vocational and Skills-based qualifications tailored specifically for Welsh learners.

Our Made-for-Wales GCSEs development has provided deep insight into how qualifications can support the Curriculum for Wales. We are in a great position to be developing General Foundation qualifications and are committed to ensuring that learners at all levels have access to high quality qualifications – like the related GCSEs, these will be based on the Statements of What Matters and the Principles of Progression. We are committed to ensuring that learners at all levels are equally valuable.

As the only board who has already developed National Qualifications for 14-16 year-olds with our first wave of GCSEs, we've created frameworks for considering how our qualifications can support schools and colleges in delivering broader aspects of the Curriculum for Wales, such as the cross-cutting themes and crosscurricular skills and how we can make space for locally devised curricula. We also introduced a range of non-examination assessments and improved representation and diversity in qualifications, enabling learners to apply knowledge in meaningful and relevant contexts.

This comprehensive experience across all qualification types offers us a unique perspective on the complete National 14-16 Qualifications offer, ensuring every qualification contributes to a coherent pathway towards realising the Four Purposes.





#### The Skills Suite: Building on a decade of success

Since introducing the Skills Challenge Certificate (SCC) in 2015, we have established unparalleled expertise in skills qualifications for 14–16-year-olds. Our Regional Support Officers maintain close relationships with schools and colleges across Wales, providing invaluable feedback — intelligence we are applying directly to develop the new Personal Project and Skills Suite.

These qualifications will equip learners with essential skills for life and work, offering centres a seamless transition from the SCC. Our skills portfolio demonstrates considerable breadth: from Pathways to Employment to our Advanced Skills Baccalaureate Wales.

## **Vocational qualifications:** Creating valued pathways

Our vocational provision must be equally valued by learners, parents and employers. For the National 14-16 Qualifications, we've engaged extensively with stakeholders. Our development structure includes Qualification Development Advisory Groups for every subject, plus overarching groups representing school and college leaders, learners, stakeholders and unions — ensuring our qualifications deliver value across all Welsh learning communities.

We're committed to simultaneous Welsh and English provision. We have extensive in-house expertise and have forged close links with Canolfan Bedwyr, Bangor University, enabling us to apply best practice in Welsh medium terminology.

## The approach to WJEC's development

of ensuring that their new Made-for-Wales qualifications align with the ambitions of the Curriculum for Wales, has been courageous, bold and principled. WJEC has embraced the cross-cutting theme of 'Diversity' with a deliberate commitment to ensure inclusion, diversity and belonging is not tokenistic but is authentic and has been powerful. WJEC did not make a knee-jerk decision with an absence of deep thought and consideration before embarking on their journey of ensuring the suite of qualifications met the requirements of the Curriculum for Wales. Instead, they committed to long-term reflection, development and understanding, that ultimately led to the qualifications being developed; not just for the learners of today, but for the Wales of tomorrow.

The influence of **DARPL** (**Diversity Anti-Racist Professional Learning**) in catalysing deeper and more nuanced conversations about belonging was significant. As one of the external partners involved in this journey, my organisation Apex Educate has seen first-hand the seriousness with which WJEC approaches its responsibility.

WJEC has created space for dialogue, challenge and meaningful collaboration. The 'heart work' necessary for reimagining the new qualifications and their design motivated WJEC's leadership to ensure this development process was carried out well. As such, the approach taken (planning in staff development, listening to stakeholder's views, reviewing the revisions carefully) has been measured and planned for, which has been important to the progress made.

WJEC made bold decisions about which texts and topics should be included in their new qualifications. This led to texts such as *Of Mice and Men* not appearing in the new GCSE English specification and a more global and diverse range of topics included in the new GCSE History. Choices were made after deep thought, careful listening, and guidance from those with lived experience, as well as input from teachers and Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLE). These decisions weren't about censorship, or sanitising history, but about asking better questions.



## Whose voices are amplified in our classrooms and how? Whose stories are told and whose are missing?

The Qualification Development Team has worked hard on developing their own understanding of inclusion to ensure the Curriculum for Wales is upheld and that the cross-cutting theme of 'Diversity' is authentically interwoven through the qualification design. They've taken on the challenge of unlearning, relearning, and building qualifications that reflect the world as it is - and as it could be. Diversity isn't just added in as an afterthought. It's being integrated into the core fabric of the qualifications themselves.

Stakeholder Engagement meetings have been carried out to ensure viewpoints from a wide range of people (teachers, senior leaders, regional consortia representatives and others) can be heard and considered. This kind of leadership matters. It's not performative. It's responsive. It's thoughtful and recognises that transformation, when done right, takes time.

Wave 3 qualifications are in development, and they reflect the same commitment to inclusion. These qualifications will provide learners of Wales with a strong opportunity to thrive in the world of work we cannot yet fully imagine. The breadth of skills incorporated and the opportunities of learning about a range of histories, herstories, events and real-world issues, are refreshing, encouraging to see and purposeful. In our current global context of uncertainty, prioritising understanding and belonging, through learning about and with each other effectively, places our future generations in good stead; for a Wales where young people grow up knowing that their identities matter, their stories belong, and their futures are theirs to shape.

Owning diversity, inclusion and belonging is pivotal to ensuring the values of respect and acceptance are lived by. Whilst the new qualifications pose questions for educators and there are challenges to overcome, if we centre our learners, our societal values and ideals, the challenge of change will be more easily overcome. WJEC has and will continue to provide support mechanisms for stakeholders to help navigate through these times. Because at the end of the day, this isn't about qualifications alone. It's about creating a Wales where every learner feels seen, respected, and ready to thrive in a world we can't yet fully imagine.

# Nurturing our partnerships across Wales

At WJEC, we believe that positive educational outcomes begin with strong relationships. Throughout 2024-25, our commitment to engagement has taken us across Wales, connecting directly with headteachers, teachers, lecturers, and learners. These connections form the foundation of our work, enabling us to develop qualifications and support that truly serve the educational community of Wales.

Our approach extends beyond formal meetings, seeking authentic dialogue helps us understand the real challenges faced in classrooms across Wales; this understanding allows us to provide targeted support where it matters most and ensures our qualifications remain accessible, inspirational, and inclusive for all learners.

#### Listening to the educational community and beyond

School and college visits remain central to our engagement strategy, providing direct insights into the classroom experiences that shape our qualification design and support. In 2024-25, these visits provided opportunities for meaningful conversations across Wales.

The visits throughout this past year provided valuable opportunities for dialogue. Our connections with headteachers, teachers and learners at Ysgol Penglais, Cardiff High School, Stanwell Comprehensive School, Caerleon Comprehensive School, Ysgol Maesydderwen, Ysgol Gyfun Gwyr, South Wales Learning Partnership - Secondary Heads Network and a meeting with Flintshire and Wrexham headteachers have directly informed our approach and support offerings. These face-to-face interactions help us understand how our qualifications are delivered in practice and allow us to address challenges directly.

## Engaging with policymakers

Our engagement extended to policy-making circles, reflecting our commitment to transparency and comprehensive stakeholder involvement throughout the Made-for-Wales qualification development process. In October 2024, we delivered a Senedd Briefing to openly share our qualification and support developments with policymakers, actively seeking their feedback and insights. We followed this with a second Senedd Briefing in May 2025 ensuring government representatives remained fully informed as key stakeholders in this educational transformation.

## **Celebrating Welsh Culture at Eisteddfod yr Urdd and Genedlaethol**

We were delighted to engage with hundreds of learners, parents and teachers at both Eisteddfod yr Urdd and Eisteddfod Genedlaethol, raising awareness of our qualifications and connecting with the Welsh-speaking community. Both celebratory events provided us with a unique opportunity to connect with the wider community in a less formal setting, demonstrating our active support for Welsh culture and language, while gathering insights in an environment that celebrates cultural achievements.

#### **Looking forward**

## From concept to creation

The Innovation Awards provide an exceptional platform for Design and Technology learners at GCSE, AS and A Level to transform their classroom learning into practical, problemsolving designs. The competition encourages young people to identify real-world challenges and develop thoughtful, creative solutions.


## Milestone celebration at the Senedd

title with her innovative rescue board design.
The judges praised her thoughtful approach to
improving emergency response tools, noting
how she combined practicality with genuine
lifesaving potential.

Other notable entries included: an accessible chess board for the partially sighted and blind, and a device providing relief for muscle cramps and spasms for people with Motor Neurone Disease —further evidence of how these young inventors are designing with empathy and understanding.

## Building on success

The Innovation Awards continue to make a lasting impact on participants' futures. Previous winners have successfully developed their concepts into patented products, demonstrating how this platform can launch genuine innovation careers. Alys Jones, 2023's GCSE category winner, recently received an "Intention to Grant" notification from the UK Intellectual Property Office for her portable footrest device — an impressive achievement in the patent industry.

As we celebrate 24 years of the Innovation Awards, we look forward to continuing this tradition of nurturing Welsh creativity and seeing how today's young innovators will shape tomorrow's world.

# Investing in our people and planet



## Nurturing a culture of environmental awareness

As an organisation, we recognise the carbon footprint associated with our activities. This is why we are actively implementing new initiatives that not only reduce our overall environmental impact but foster a sustainable culture among our people.

#### Our journey towards Net Zero

The creation of environmental monitoring dashboards for our Western Avenue and Treforest sites marks a significant milestone in our sustainability journey.

These monitoring systems provide detailed visibility into our direct and indirect emissions and purchased energy, guiding our strategic path towards Net Zero by 2032.

## Green Champions: Empowering environmental leadership

Our Green Champions Programme continues to strengthen, with 13 Environmental Champions currently undertaking our Sustainability qualification (pictured below). This initiative provides our team with foundational knowledge in sustainability, enabling them to expand their expertise through a recognised qualification.

Our Champions serve as internal advocates, implementing best practices and inspiring colleagues to embrace more sustainable behaviours across our operations. They also actively seek and suggest innovative sustainability ideas for WJEC to review and take forward, creating a valuable pipeline of environmental initiatives.





Reduction of gas usage at our Treforest site by approximately 64,000 kWh through heating electrification - enough energy to heat 6 average UK schools for an entire winter - representing a 45% decrease from our 2018/19 baseline.



Our electrical energy efficiency has improved by 33%, from printing 56 to 74 A3 sheets of paper/ kWh of electricity — reducing our electricity consumption by 25% for every exam paper we produce, enough saved electricity to power computer suites in 20 schools for a full academic year.



A substantial £300,000 investment in intelligent lighting systems across both our sites.

## Key progress areas

Our sustainability initiatives continue to deliver meaningful results across multiple areas of our operations. **Highlights include:** 

#### Renewable energy

We're proud to announce significant investments in on-site renewable energy generation, adding to our existing sustainability initiatives. Our Western Avenue site will soon feature a solar panel installation, representing a £98,000 investment in our clean energy future. The project will install 201 solar panels, generating 86 MWh of electricity annually - enough to power computers in 430 classrooms all year-round - while delivering CO2e savings of 17 tonnes per year, equivalent to taking 835 school bus journeys off the road.

#### Waste reduction

Our commitment to reducing waste has led to an innovative partnership with Manetti, which is focused on addressing the environmental impact of plastic bags used for exam papers. During 2024-25, we recycled almost 1 tonne of plastic through this programme — equivalent to 89,000 sandwich bags, enough to pack school lunches for nearly 500 learners for an entire academic year.

#### Supplier engagement

Recognising that our environmental footprint extends well beyond our direct operations, we have intensified engagement with our major suppliers regarding sustainable practices. This strategic dialogue focuses on understanding their emissions profiles, obtaining more accurate environmental data, and collaboratively identifying more sustainable alternatives for our supply chain.

Since joining WJEC, I've been impressed by the organisation's proactive approach to sustainability. Our significant investments in reducing the carbon footprint of our facilities, combined with comprehensive emissions work with suppliers, demonstrate real commitment to environmental responsibility.

From Director-level initiatives to our voluntary Environmental Green Champions driving shop-floor improvements, sustainability passion is evident throughout the organisation. It's exciting to be part of a company with such a clear environmental direction.
