The writer also describes the beauty of nature to convince us to give camping a chance. 'You see the stars before you go to sleep and you wake up to the sound of birds.' The writer then says in the next line that in the past, people have enjoyed it only they gave it a chance. The writer then dispels the myths of camping by saying 'Camping doesn't have to mean roughing it.' This suggests that we can be comfortable when camping unlike it is usually seen as. The writer then uses the technique of listing to present the positive things that can be done whilst camping: 'getting active; exploring the landscape, visiting attractions.' The writer then says in the next sub-heading in bold that 'Camping is cheap and easy' this persuades us to

give camping a chance because it is cost effective
 and only so little effort. The writer ~~states~~ then
 says 'Campsites start from 'just £6 a night'
 this is persuasive because it tells us that we do
 not need to spend a large sum of money on
 camping. The writer again uses the technique of
 listing to sum up the practicalities that can
 be done whilst camping 'playing games, enjoying
 the country side, spend most of the day outside'
 the next paragraph the writer says that
 camping can 'leave the stress of your daily life
 behind' suggesting that camping can be stress-free.
 The writer then suggests that we can learn new
 skills such as cooking even simple meals.
 Text C also says that kids love camping which
 means that you can bring your whole family to enjoy
 the experience. Text C also says that camping gives
 you a chance to experience the great British outdoors.

However, text D states that it can be peaceful when saying "the sense of being at one with your surroundings." This shows that you are isolated but in a positive way as it can help you relax. "Seeing nature" wild camping is very nature infested which can be nice at times however, it can be extremely scary as well. The text states that when the writer was awoken they thought it was a big cat and then they "could hear my heart beating out of my chest." Wild camping also includes "beautiful scenes" such as sunset and sunrise. The writer states that these scenes are enjoyed by his own company and they "had it all to myself." This shows that you don't have to worry about other people while wild camping. So you can stay calm. The text also says that "my new bovine companion." This means that although you are alone, nature is still in your company.

In Text D, the writer says that "there was no one around for miles" meaning that he feels he is lonely and isolated. However, the writer in Text E says

In Text D, the writer says that they "love camping" meaning he feels that camping is lovely. However, in Text E the writer says that they'll "never going camping again" ^{no} telling us that he despises camping due to his experience.

In Text D, the writer ^{says} ~~says~~ that is "sat with a hot drink watching the stars" giving us the impression that the writer feels relaxed. Differently, text E ^{describes} ~~says~~ that camping as 'Hell'. It tells us that he feels awful and ^{despises} ~~hates~~ camping. ^{not really}

In Text D, the writer says he "snuggled into my sleeping bag" meaning he feels comfortable or he uses the word "snuggled." Contrastingly, text E says he had a "sleepless night" giving us a sense of discomforting and unwilling to camping.

In Text D the writer was awoken by "a noise outside" meaning he was feeling disturbed and unsettled. Similarly, text E says that the "neighbors started up a party" which gives off the same type of feeling of disturbance.

In text D it says ^{D2} they "love camping". In comparison, in text E it says they are "not fussy about living a bit rough for a few days". These are similar because they both say ^{E3} they are okay with camping.

In text D it says they love ^{D1} "being at one with your surroundings". However in text E it says they "can cope with relentless rain and sleeping on rock hard ground" ^{E4} these are different because one says camping as good scenery and the other highlights the things that can be a little bit annoying, but they can cope.

In text D it says they were "Feeling Contented". Whereas in text E it says they "can't cope ^{D3} with a sleepless night". ^{D3} these are different because one was cozy in bed and the other was not. they've already had E4

In text D it says ^{D6} they saw "the most beautiful scenes" they "could have imagined". Similarly, in text E it says it's "not the conditions you're in that can be miserable". These are similar because they are both in favour of camping.

Some of the evidence not fully contextualised. Tries to force some comparisons. This clip has been used to stress that this is not a location exercise - focus should be comparison. MUST NOT count ticks. This could have six ticks on but doesn't not securely meet the 5-6 mark band more 5 than 6.

The ~~writers~~ ^{ov} writers of text D and E heavily Contrast each others feelings of Camping. From a Serene, mostly peaceful trip in text D to a hellish night in text E.

Text D begins by describing the peaceful, relaxing evening they experienced. "I pitched my tent, boiled up the stove and sat with a hot drink watching the stars." ^{D1} This shows a feeling of peace as the writer methodically and calmly recites their evening. However in Contrast, the ~~writers~~ writer of text E begins by telling the reader of her terrible night, "Hell is other people. Hell is lying in a tent at 3am listening to drunken bores..." ^{E1} This depicts her rather sour feelings of the ~~evening~~ evening which Contrasts ^{E1} the Sweet feelings in text E.

Text D states "this is why I love camping." which shows their positive feelings towards the current experience. ^{D2} On the Contrary, text E tells us "I can't cope with a sleepless night." ^{E6} This depicts the writers negative



attitude and feelings towards her current experience, the stark opposite of text D

However, there is one similar feeling from text D and E, as text D tells us "a little while later I woke up to a noise outside. The local rumours of big cats leapt into my mind." This ~~text~~ shows us the feeling of dread and disturbance as the writer touches the possibility of trouble. Similarly in text E, the writer details her feelings of disturbance as she rants "Being kept awake by the sound of three men snoring... is slightly disturbing." and reveals her feelings of dread as she tells us "I covered my ears with a pillow" showing her desperation to block out the coming noise.

In Conclusion, ~~the writers~~ the writers detail two very different set of feelings, from peace, serenity and only slight dread in text D to anger and lots of dread in text E.
